Organizational Overview

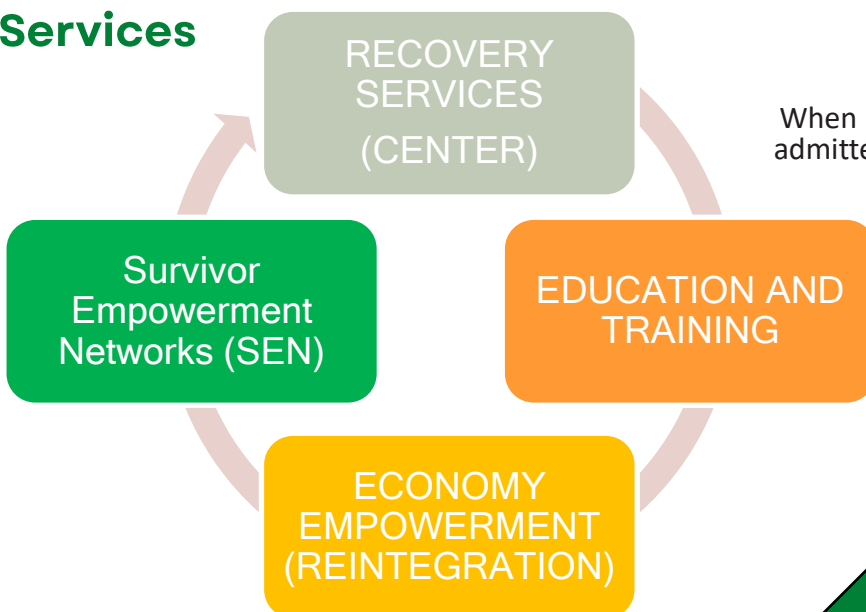

Our Vision: A world where children are safe from slavery.

Our Mission: to care for and secure the rights of young women and girls who are victims or at risk of being victims of slavery and to successfully recover, educate, train and reintegrate them into mainstream society through financial independence in a sustainable and innovative manner. We accomplish this by helping and teaching them how to achieve financial independence through sustainable careers. We then welcome them to become part of our survivor empowerment network.

Target: The girls who are victims or at risk of being victims of sexual trafficking, abuses or indentured slavery and or exploitation.

Impact Highlights

Most of our expected indicators of each program set forth for 2025 were well executed with good results even though we had some challenges.

RECOVERY

- ❑ 95 (22 new) girls received holistic care at Tom Dy center in the 12-month periods.
- ❑ 115 girls received 978 healthcare support;
- ❑ 120 girls received psychosocial counseling support;
- ❑ 66 (21 new) girls received legal assistance throughout legal process, 72 (29 new) suspects were arrested and 35 suspects were brought to justices.

EDUCATION AND TRAINING

- ❑ 217 girls received middle and high school, higher-degree university and vocational skills training scholarships

ECONOMIC EMPOWERMENT/REINTEGRATION

- ❑ 53 girls were reintegrated into their families with job employment, small business, education scholarships and others

SURVIVOR EMPOWERMENT NETWORK (SEN)

- ❑ 88 girls were active SEN members

Key action by month

January

Our founder and President Somaly MAM signed the MoU and recognition certificate with the Minister of Ministry of Social Veteran and Youth for 3-year term covered 2025-2028.

February

One of our major donors Project Futures from Australia organized Corporate Partners Immersion Trip to the Tom Dy center to see our work on the ground.

March

Contestants of Miss Global Pageants from over 60 countries visited us to learn about our work. Organized gala dinner to fundraise support our work, and to sensitize child abuse issue to public at large.

April

As usual, we hired the independent KPMG audit firm to conduct our annual financial audits to exam and evaluate our financial statement to make sure a fair records and accurate representation of transactions.

May

We celebrated the 76th International Children's Rights Day in the Tom Dy center for all the girls throughout various activities related Child Right principles.

June

Our Founder and President accompanied by the Operation Director and 2 survivors to attend the gala dinner organized by our major donor Solyna foundation.

July

Staff capacity buildings were conducted on various skills such as stress mangt.; report writing; cook; basic case mangt.; communication and public speaking; Child development and parental skills and Online English class for survivor staffs.

August

1,471 visitors, who were girls' relatives, foreigners, corporates, footballers, banks, celebrities, governmental officials and public at large, had visited the Tom Dy center to learn about our work.

September

The annual fair vote to select new term for another year of Team-leaders (Child Committee) was conducted to integrate the participatory approach of daily program-operation in the Tom Dy center.

October

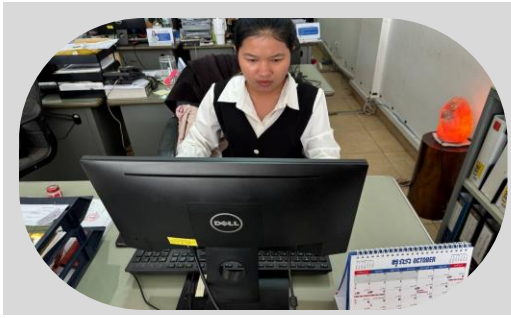
The annual inspection of our victim services at Tom Dy center was conducted by MoSVY to measure whether our operations have been applied with the national minimum standard. The evaluation scores were 195 of 201 (97%).

November

The 2-day annual consultative workshop was conducted to review level of each program accomplishment and challenges in 2025 and develop new work and budget plan 2026.

December

The board meeting was conducted to review the organizational program achievement in 2025, submitted work and budget plan 2026 for approval.



Sreykich (PP-3515) is now 22 years old, a survivor of rape when she was 17 years old. She is 5th daughter of 6 siblings of 1 brother.

The perpetrators were arrested and convicted to 15 years imprisonment each by provincial court of Kampot.

She was referred to AFESIP Cambodia for safety reason, in August 2021, by DoSVY. She received holistic care from AFESIP for over 5 years.

She dreamed of working in a taxation sector. She has successfully graduated bachelor degree of finance and banking, after she spent year 4 at university of Economics and Finance, in 2025.

She works full-time in operation export unit of one private company in Phnom Penh. She gets regular income to support her living. We reintegrated her with job employment.



Narin is 24 years old. She is a 2nd daughter of 6 siblings of 3 sisters. The family situation was very poor and parents were alcoholism.

She is a survivor of child-rape and child-trafficking for slavery, committed by a neighbor and her birth mother. She was forced to work late at night, got up early at 3 or 4 in the morning and went to bed

late at mid night. She had often been forced to sleep under rain, beaten with electrical wire and rattan-whip.

She was referred to AFESIP, by DoSVY of Kratie in 2009 for safety and recovery services, where she received holistic care for over 16 years.

She had started school when she arrived at AFESIP. In the future, she wanted to be a psychiatrist. She successfully graduated her bachelor degree of psychology, in 2025, from RUPP. Now, she works in psychology program of AFESIP Cambodia to help the other victims, who had gone through same fate she did.



Level of program execution

Tom Dy center

It is a healing place where we offer safe and secured accommodation, 3 balanced meals a day, cares, nutrition, healthcare, psychosocial counseling and legal assistance aiming at developing both physical and mental welfare and well-beings of the girl victims whom we work with.



What we said we would do

We said that we would provide holistic care to 103 girls, in which 30 of them were newly admitted girls in 2025 and 73 others were leftover by end of 2024 in Tom Dy center.



What we did

95 girls received holistic care, safe and secured accommodation and nutrition, in Tom Dy center. 22 (+1 re-admitted) of them were newly admitted girls in 2025 and 73 others leftover by end of 2024. The level of overall accomplishment is good even though achievements were lower than we planned for.



Referral sources

Over 3 decades, AFESIP has built up great network across Cambodia such as with Departments of Social Affairs, Veterans and Youth Rehabilitation (DoSVY), local authorities and other stakeholders as referral sources of the victimized girls for victim service and holistic care at the Tom Dy center.

Movement out

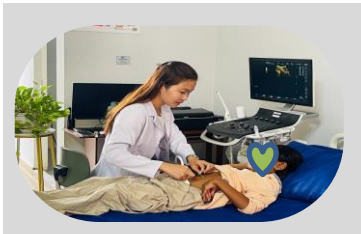
- 5 of them were referred to their families;
- 4 of them were referred to higher-degree university scholarship (Bac II exams);
- 19 others reintegrated with middle and high scholarships staying outside center.
- 67 girls are receiving ongoing holistic care in Tom Dy center by end of 2024.



Level of program execution

Health Care

The victims of sex trafficking, rape, sexual abuse or exploitation always carry scars and stigma deeply, that contribute to the damage of their physical and mental development. The girls received general physical assessment and immediate treatment upon arrivals at the center and the necessary follow-up consultations & treatments as required from our medical doctor.



What we said we would do

We said that we would provide 100% of healthcare to the 30 newly admitted girls upon arrivals in the Tom Dy center and 80 girls would receive ongoing healthcare follows-up and treatment as required.



What we did

100% of 22 newly admitted girls to the Tom Dy center received general healthcare assessment with 5 common symptoms of bacterial vaginosis, candida, dental curries, healthy and vaginitis. 115 girls received 978 healthcare follows-up and treatment as required. The level of achievement is good.

Medical services offered

- 93 girls received 11 national vaccinations;
- 133 girls and staffs received flu vaccination. 32 of them were staff members;
- 74 girls received dental care treatment;
- 57 girls received EENT (Eyes, Ear, Nose and Throat) care treatment. 25 others received treatment on myopia glasses/surgical;
- 2 girls received medications for serious life treatment;
- 95 girls received 3 sessions of basic health care training on Human body develop.; pregnancy; child develop.; puberty male development and puberty female develop;
- 11 girls were hospitalized for emergency of healthcare. 6 girls received Esthetic and hygiene materials (puberty girls);

Materials purchased

- 2 sets of uniforms for staffs, 2 mini surgery equipment, 2 beds, 1 autoclave, 1 foggy machine, 1 chair and 1 infusion drip supplier;



Level of program execution

Psychology

Recognizing that the core effects of psychological trauma are disempowerment and disconnection, the recovery process focuses on empowerment and in making new connections for the girls we work with both in center and at communities. They received psychosocial counseling assessment, immediate treatment upon arrivals at the center and the necessary psychosocial follow-up as required from our psychologists.



What we said we would do

111 girls, in which 30 of them were newly admitted girls to the Tom Dy center in 2025 and 81 others leftover by end of December 2024 would receive ongoing counseling follows-up and treatment as required.



What we did

120 girls, in which of 22 (100%) of them were newly admitted girls in 2025 and 98 others leftover by end of 2024, received general psychosocial assessment and numerous of counseling follows up and treatment as required. The common symptoms of the new admission were worry, homesick, low mood, stress and trauma. The level of accomplishment is higher than we expected with good result.

Healing activities conducted

- 2 groups of 82 girls received 29 art-therapy sessions on drawing, playing, handicraft, origami, dancing and relaxation music;
- 3 groups of 81 girls received 23 self-help group sessions on various topics;
- 3 groups of 83 girls received 8 sessions of Primary Mental Health Care and Prevention Education on various subjects;
- 2 groups of 95 girls trained and practiced weekend yoga-training of 63 sessions;
- 97 girls received 37 sessions of meditation training and practiced in Tom Dy center, specially on Holy Day of Buddha;
- 60 girls, who are active reintegration and scholarship holders, received 84 psychosocial follows up by in-person via phone calls;



Level of program execution

Legal protection

It ensures all victims, whom we work with, who involved with legal process, are provided with legal assistance and representation throughout the legal proceedings and works closely with other legal aids partner organizations and stakeholders to prepare legal cases; bring suspects to justice and ensure that victims are treated fairly throughout judicial processes..



What we said we would do

66 girls involved with legal process, would receive legal assistance throughout the process, in which 36 of them would leftover by end of 2024 and 30 others would be newly admitted girls in 2025.



What we did

66 girls received legal assistance throughout legal process. 45 of them leftover by end of 2024 and 21 others were newly admitted girls in 2025. The achievement was lower than what we planned due to the capacity of the center many girls needed longer term care in the center.

73 suspects were arrested. 55 of them leftover by end of December 2024 and 18 others were new cases in 2025. In some cases, perpetrators are more than one.

Legal assistance

- 21 lawyers were requested from legal-aids partners and voluntary lawyer-firm of Samdach Hun Sen to defend and represent the victims throughout the legal process at courts;
- 21 victim girls received forensic analysis for pressing charges against their perpetrators at courts;
- 17 girls received 21 testimonies and 24 girls received 27 trials at courts. 27 perpetrators were convicted to imprisonment with the lowest of sentences 4 and the highest ones were 15 years in jail. The victim had never received the compensation;
- 65 girls received 570 monitoring and follows up with lawyers on their legal cases progresses. 290 meetings were conducted with DoSVY and local authorities on newly admitted cases, in which 20 of them were in-person meetings and 270 others were phone calls,



Level of program execution

Education and Training

The ultimate objective is to enable the beneficiaries to attain self-sufficiency, particularly financial independence through sustainable career solution, by supporting them with job employment or run their own business post-graduation, utilizing the skills they equipped with.

What we said we would do

240 girls would received solid education and vocational skills training in a safe environment where are in public schools and at professional service providers for vocational skills training. The education we provide to the girls start from kindergarten to higher-degree in university

What we did

217 girls received middle and high school scholarships staying inside and outside the Tom Dy center after they recovered and reintegrated to their families in communities at large across Cambodia; higher-degree university and vocational skills training scholarships. Our level of achievement is lower than we planned for due to some reason of number of girls admitted to the center, none of the newly admitted girls wished to get skills training as following:

- 92 girls received middle and high school scholarships stayed inside center. 74 of them leftover by end of 2024 and 18 others were new enrolments in 2025;
- 100 girls received middle and high school scholarships stayed outside center. 80 of them leftover by end of 2024 and 20 other were new enrolments;
- 24 girls received higher-degree university scholarships. 17 of them leftover by end of 2024 and 7 others were enrolments in 2025;
- 1 girl, leftover by end of 2024, received vocational skills training scholarship.

National school examinations

- 17 middle and high-school scholarships had taken upper-secondary school grade 9 to high-school grade 10. 13 of them passed the exams;
- 9 girls had taken their high-school diploma exams (Bac II). 6 of them passed the exams. 7 of them received higher-degree university scholarships;



Level of program execution

Middle and high school scholarships staying inside the center



What we said we would do

99 girls would receive middle and high scholarships staying inside the Tom Dy center. 74 of them leftover by end of 2024 and 25 others were new enrolments in 2025.



What we did

92 girls received middle and high scholarships while they stayed in the Tom Dy center. 74 of them leftover by end of 2024 and 18 others were new enrolments in 2025.

We provided them uniforms, school supplies, daily pocket money for their light snack at school on school day, daily transportation to and forth school, enrollment support, regular monitoring and follow up and other necessities.

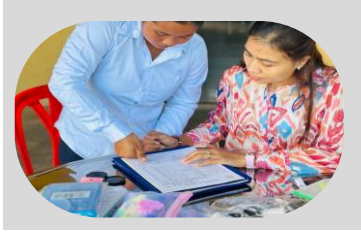
Their movements out from the center are:

- 4 of them reintegrated to their families;
- 19 of them reintegrated to families with middle and high school scholarships;
- 3 of them moved to higher-degree scholarships after they took BAC II exams;
- 66 others are ongoing middle and high school scholarship holders;
- 2 peer-learning groups were formed by selecting the outstanding students of primary schools to teach the lower students. We could not reach the indicators because we focused more on primary grades;
- 17 middle and high school scholarships, staying inside the center, received extra classes on grade 6; 9 and 12 at private classes;
- 18 girls received school referral paperwork to support their enrolments in public schools;
- 14 monthly meetings were conducted with all the middle and high school scholarships staying in the center to follow up their education progressed;
- 10 outstanding students, who studied hard, of top mark from number 1 to 3 were encouraged and motivated with gift;
- 1 orientation presentation on professional career (skills/major) was conducted for grade middle and high school scholarships grade 10-12.



Level of program execution

Post Reintegration Middle and high school scholarships



What we said we would do

104 girls would receive middle and high scholarship after they recovered staying outside the center with their families. 80 of them leftover by end of 2024 and 24 others were new enrolments in 2024.

What we did



100 girls received middle and high school scholarship supports after they recovered staying outside the center with their families in communities. 80 of them leftover by end of 2024 and 20 others were new enrolments in 2025. We supported them uniforms, school supplies, bicycles, enrollment support, regular monitoring and follow up and other necessities.

Their movements out from the center are:

- 27 of them dropped out by some reason i.e to work and run small business;
- 4 of them moved to higher-degree scholarships after they took BAC II exams;
- 2 others (1 re-admitted and 1 was decease by disease).
- 67 others are ongoing middle and high school scholarship holders;

Activities carried out

- 22 middle and high school post reintegration scholarships received 1 bicycle each to support their daily transportation to and forth schools;
- 25 middle and high school post reintegration scholarship holders had received monthly pocket-money support from the PM of RGC.
- 8 trips of field missions were carried out to distribute school uniforms and supplies to 67 middle and high school post reintegration scholarships in communities at large.
- 84 middle and high school post reintegration scholarship received 252 monitoring and follows up from our education and training program team.



Level of program execution

Higher-degree university scholarships



What we said we would do

29 girls would receive higher-degree university scholarships to study in various universities. 17 of them leftover by end of 2024 and 12 others were new enrolments in 2025.



What we did

24 girls received higher-degree university scholarships to study in various universities in Phnom Penh. 17 of them leftover by end of 2024 and 7 others were new enrolments in 2025.

The achievements was lower than what we planned for because 5 of them dropped out to work to earn incomes to support their families, in which 3 of them dropped out in grade 12 and 2 (1 grade A) others dropped out after they took high-school exams of grade 12 exams.

Their movements out are:

- 3 of them successfully graduated bachelor degrees of IT, Finance and banking and psychology. They get full-time job by utilizing the skills they studied in.
- 21 others are continuing higher-degree university scholarships in Phnom Penh;

Activities carried out

- 4 higher-degree university scholarship holders received 1 laptop each to support their studies;
- 19 higher-degree university and middle and high scholarships who studied high-school scholarships received orientation presentation on AFESIP-cambodias general activities.
- 1 short-course training was provided to the higher-degree university scholarships on how to write CV, cover letter and planning to choose major at university;
- 1 orientation presentation on professional career (chosen major) was conducted for 7 new scholarships to support their informed-decision making and future career. And we hosted them to visit various universities.
- 7 of them received English class at private school and computer class in Tom Dy center.
- 24 higher-degree scholarship holders received 214 follows-up on their studies progresses, health and other problem encountered from our education and training team members.



Level of program execution

Vocational skills training

What we said we would do

8 girls would receive vocational skills training scholarships.

What we did

1 girl, who leftover by end of 2024, received vocational skills training scholarship in 2025. She successfully graduated and we reintegrated her with job employment.

The achievement was lower than our plan because none of new scholarship enrolled in 2025.

We supported vocational skills training scholarship to the young women who could not study general education in public school due to some reason. We did not run the in-house vocational skills training but we sent them to train in the skills they chose at outsourced professional service-providers. We supported them training fee, training materials, monthly living allowance, healthcare, psychosocial counseling, orientation sessions to support their informed-decision.

English language class

English is an international language, in which is used in everyday life around the world. It is a standard language in a variety of fields such as international communication, computer coding and higher education. Cambodian is one of the countries uses English for daily international business communication, studies and works in differences fields. We provide English language class to the girls we work with so that they can use it for their daily work when they growth up and graduated.



What we said we would do

55 girls would receive English language classes on File Elementary third edition; English File Third edition; Super mind; Let's go III and English Alphabet.

What we did

89 girls received English language classes on English File Elementary third edition; English File Third edition; Super mind; Let's go III and English Alphabet.



Teaching support materials

- 20 books of English Alphabet Practice were developed and printed for new learners.



Level of program execution

- 22 grammar books were developed and printed for higher level students.
- 44 copies, in which 22 of them were Family and Friends III and 22 others were reading books were copied for students in English class; Do we still need these books? Because we were in common agreement to send higher-degree university scholarship to study English at outside center.
- 9 outstanding students of top-mark in English class were encouraged with motivation-gift and appreciation certificate

Computer training lab

Computer skills are the knowledge and ability to use computer and related technology for our daily life of work, studies and entertainment. AFESIP Cambodia provides computer skills to our girls we work with so that they can use it to work when they growth up and and graduated.



What we said we would do

70 girls would receive computer training on English and Khmer typing; Ms. Word; Ms. Excel and PowerPoint; Adobe Photoshop; Adobe Flash; Internet & Email, Graphic design and create group learning;



What we did

66 girls received computer training on English and Khmer typing; Ms. Word; Ms. Excel and PowerPoint; Adobe Photoshop; Adobe Flash; Internet & Email, Graphic design and group-learning;

Teaching support materials

- 5 desktops and 1 laptop were donated by Church for computer class;
- 30 e-mail and internet books were developed and printed for computer class;
- 30 course books of Microsoft Office Words were developed and printed for computer class;
- 16 outstanding students of top mark 1-3 (10ps) and voluntary teaching students (6ps) in computer class were encouraged with motivation gift and appreciation certificates;
- Created peer-learning group by selecting the higher-level students to teach the lower ones. This activity schedule is conducted with the girls' availabilities from public schools;



Level of program execution

Library

Computer skills are the knowledge and ability to use computer and related technology for our daily life of work, studies and entertainment. AFESIP Cambodia provides computer skills to our girls we work with so that they can use it to work when they growth up and and graduated.



What we said we would do

107 girls would access to read various books and other resources in the library in Tom Dy center;



What we did

95 girls accessed to read various books and other resources in the library in Tom Dy center.

Brought in about 100 academic books to the library for the girls to read and research.



Economic empowerment

The ultimate goal is for each girl to achieve self-independence. At this phase, girls involved in the program are less dependent on support from AFESIP Cambodia and are capable of giving back to other girls who are working to get to this phase. When the girls have made substantial progress on their recoveries; education and training, it begins a process of reintegrating them back to a regular life in community at large. This process involves working as an apprentice or intern, or run own business.



What we said we would do

38 girls would be reintegrated, in which 8 of them with job employment; 10 of them micro-business and 20 others with middle and high-school scholarships, after they graduated their chosen major and skills training.



What we did

53 girls reintegrated, in which 3 of them with micro-businesses; 17 of them with job employments; 21 of them with middle and high-school scholarships and 12 others without support initially.

The achievement is higher than we planned for;

Other supporting activities

- 93 girls received 200 family visits. The family visits were mainly taken place during the events of Khmer New Year and Pachum Ben (Ancestor festival) and school vacation. Most of family visits were taken place at community at large and few others were at the Tom Dy center;
- 22 (100%) newly admitted girls received consultation of personal career plan;
- 88 actively reintegration cases received 232 monitoring and follows up by in-person via phone calls;
- 8 reintegrated girls received additional support post-reintegration, in which 2 of them for healthcare; 4 of them for wedding ceremonies and 2 others for small business expansion.
- 3 families of middle and high school scholarships staying inside and outside the center and reintegrated girls, who were in need, received family support;
- 25 families of the girls, who reintegrate with middle and high school scholarship, were supported with Saving money from Sam Dach Hun SEN;



Survivor empowerment network (SEN)

SEN is a formulation a group of survivors, who have successfully recovered from all major physical and psychological injures, reintegrated back into communities across Cambodia. The aim is to empower and promote social welfare and the well-being of survivors. Sensitize and raise awareness to the public at large as they call for better solutions. Each of the SEN members plays a significant role as change-makers in their communities by bringing the voices of the voiceless to the forefront.



What we said we would do

We said that we would identify and award 81 SEN members, in which 66 of them leftover from previous years and 15 others would be new members in 2025.



What we did

88 SEN members, in which 66 of them leftover from previous years and 22 others were new members.

We organized luncheons with SEN members on a regular basis. The objectives of the meeting were to share experience, challenges, update the work of SEN and strengthen relationship with each other.

The achievement is higher than we planned for;

Key activities

- SEN supported the work of recovery, education and training, legal protection and reintegration program both at the center and communities at large;
- 90 girls participated in an annual fair vote in August 2025, in Tom Dy center to select the team leaders at their best interest to bring out the voices of their needs at center. 5 girls were selected by this fair vote to be the team leaders;
- 119 girls continued to receive monthly allowance supported by PM of the RGC;
- 36 meetings were conducted. 12 of them were conducted with team leaders to support their daily activities and 24 others were carried out with SEN team, program staffs and girls in general as the need be to support and give them directions;
- 127 girls have received godparents support from Solya Foundation based in Switzerland.



Operational staffs

30 staffs worked for AFESIP-Cambodia in 2025. 20 of them were female and 10 others were male staffs. 84% of our full-time female staffs are survivors. Our work is to empower Victims to become Survivors and Empower Survivors to be part of Solution because survivors are brilliant change-makers in the fields of our work and they are the symbol of rule model for the other victims to look up. The survivor staffs are currently holding job titles as senior management team member and program managers of Survivor Empowerment Network, Residential Program and Nurse, Education and Training, Coordinator of higher-degree university and vocational skills training scholarship, Psychology, Economic Empowerment, Care Givers, Cook, Finance Officer, Sponsorship Coordinator of godparents and Admin, and Assistant to Legal Protection Officer.

Project Management

Bi-monthly meetings had been conducted regularly with all program managers aiming at sharing work progressed of each program; receiving feedback of following-up action from previous meetings; receiving update; develop tools and or any tasks as required; developing next plan of action for any certain activities and so on. This was a part of team work building; staff capacity building and project management for the staffs. Each program conducted weekly meetings with its program staffs for the same purpose.

Every month, each program manager had to develop its monthly activity and budget plan of the program in alignment of master plan and submitted to its Line Managers for approval on every 25 of the months and submitted monthly activity report of project implemented to Line Managers on every 1st week of following month. Every 4th week of the month each program staff had to update or record their fieldworks into paper files for database computerization to produce internal and external reports.



Staff capacity building

We built up capacity of our staffs on series of various short-courses training on Stress Management; food preparation and cooking skills for our cook, meditation; Online English class; Child Development and Parental Skills; report writing; Fundamental Case Management; communication and public speaking training for survivor staffs and management.



Safe and secured accommodation

- 94 (30 new) girls will receive holistic care in Tom Dy center;
- 50 girls will receive various life skills training courses on good;
- 41 meetings will be conducted with the girls in the center;
- 4 events and sightseeing i.e Khmer New Year, Pachum Ben etc



Health Care Services

- 110 (30 new) girls will receive healthcare;
- 80 girls will receive 2 rounds of dental care treatment
- 23 girls will receive EENT (Eyes, Ear, Nose and Throat) care;
- 115 young women and girls will receive flu vaccination.



Psychosocial counseling (psych)

- 90 girls will receive mental health care;
- 50 girls will receive 24 sessions of art therapy;
- 50 girls will receive 36 sessions of self-help group;
- 95 girls will receive 6 sessions of PMHC.



Legal assistance

- 60 girls will receive legal assistance (primary hearings & trials);
- 25 alleged perpetrators will be brought to justices;
- 180 meetings will be conducted by in-person via phone-calls
- 300 follows up will conducted on 60 girls' legal cases.



Education and training

215 girls will receive education support as following:

- 89 in-centered scholarships;
- 94 post-reintegration scholarships;
- 27 higher-degree university scholarships
- 5 vocational skills training scholarships.



Economic Empowerment (Reintegration)

- 48 recovered girls will be reintegrated with job; education ...;
- 120 girls will receive 220 family visits during their in Tom Dy;
- 177 active reintegration girls will receive 531 monitoring & FU;
- 30 girls will receive consultation of personal care plan.



Survivor Empowerment Network (SEN)

- 103 active survivor empowerment network members;
- 127 sponsored girls will receive follows up (godparent (Solyna));
- 12 monthly meetings will be conducted with all the girls;
- 1 fair vote will be conducted to select their new team-leader.



Staff Capacity Building

- Online English class; Reintegration forms (MoSVY); Graphic Design (teacher); Group-supervision; Burnout prevention and staff self-care and team spirit; basic counseling approach, Systemic Family Therapy for psychologists

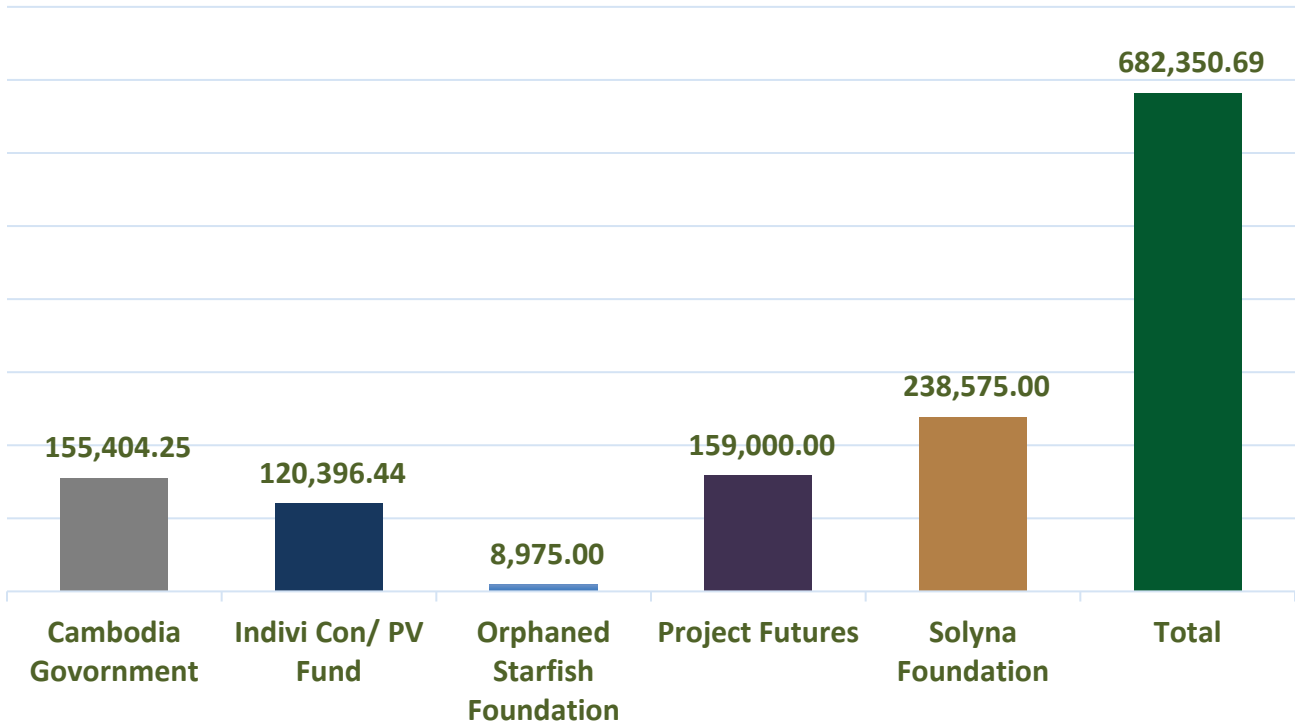

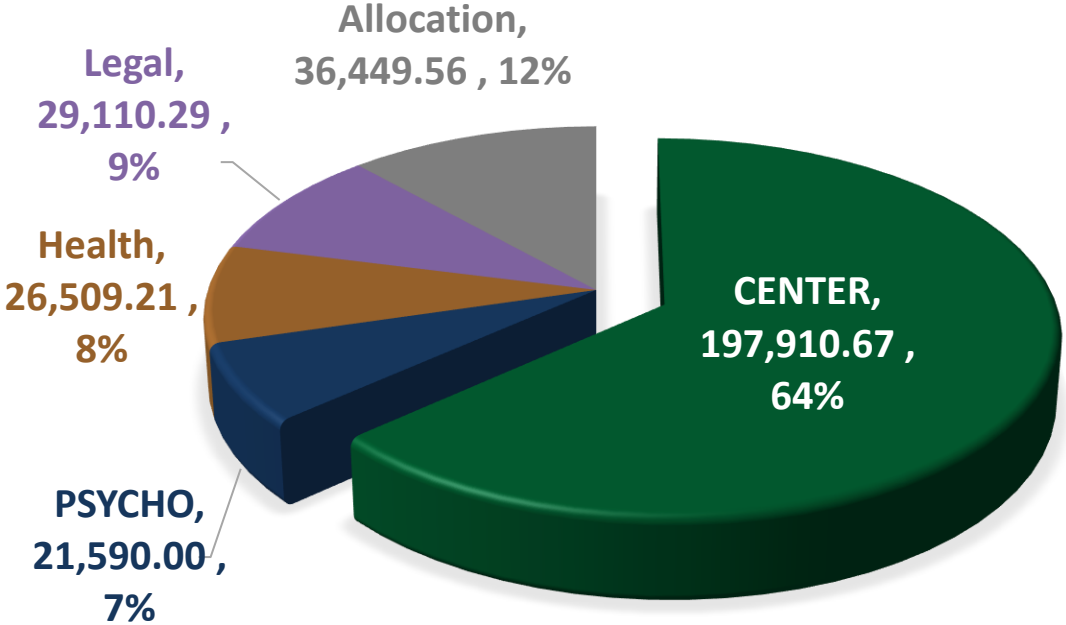
