NOTES TO THE STATEMENT OF INCOME AND EXPENDITURE FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2013

1. GENERAL INFORMATION AND ACTIVITIES

Agir Pour Les Femmes En Situation Precaire - AFESIP Cambodia ("the Organisation") is a not-for-profit organisation that was registered on 18 April 1996 in Phnom Penh, the Kingdom of Cambodia. The Organisation's mission is to care for and secure the rights of those victimized by human trafficking and sex slavery, and to successfully rehabilitate and reintegrate survivors into mainstream society through financial independence in a sustainable and innovative manner. The Organisation also seeks to combat the causes and consequences of trafficking in persons for sexual exploitation through outreach work in HIV/AIDS prevention, advocacy work, campaigning, and representation and participation in women's issues at national, regional, and international forums. The Organisation is funded by grants and contributions from its donors, which comprise both Cambodian and international non-government organisations.

On 1 May 2011, AFESIP entered into a contract with Lotus Culture Ltd to form a new project called "Kumnit Thmey". The objective of this project is to provide employment opportunities on a sustained basis for girls whom had been victims of sex trafficking and or at high risk of it, who had gotten training in sewing skills in the shelters with sewing skills.

On October 2013, the Organsation starts the operation of a salon called "Somaly Mam Beauty Salon" located at #560, Mondol 1 Village, Svay Dangkum Commune, Siem Reap District, Siem Reap province. This project has been fully supported financially and technically by Estee Lauder Company for 3-year operation. The financial support of this project had come through SMF. The objective of this salon is to provide on the quality of job trainings of salon operation and employment opportunities on a sustained basis for girls whom had been victims of sex trafficking and or at high risk of it, who had gotten training in hairdressing skills in the shelters.

The HIV/AIDS prevention's operations are widespread, with offices located in six municipalities and provinces: Phnom Penh, Anlong Veng (Udor Meanchey), Pailin, Siem Reap, Koh Kong and Stung Treng.

The Organisation's head office is located at No. 62CEo, Street 598, Sangkat Boeung Kok II, Khan Tuol Kork, Phnom Penh, and the Kingdom of Cambodia.

As at 31 December 2013, the Organization had 112 employees (31 December 2012: 97 employees).

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a. Basis of preparation

The statement of income and expenditure expressed in United States dollars ("US\$") has been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The Organisation's policy is to prepare the statement of income and expenditure on the cash basis except for advances. On this basis, income is recognised when received rather than when earned and expenditure, except for advances, is recognised when paid rather than when incurred.

b. Foreign currency transactions

Transactions in currencies other than the US\$ are translated into US\$ at the rate of exchange prevailing on the date of the transaction. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the translation of cash and bank balances and advances in currencies other than the US\$ at the year-end exchange rate are recognised in the statement of income and expenditure.

c. Income and expenditure

The primary sources of income are grants from donors and individual donations through bank transfers, and the income is recorded gross of bank charges. Expenditure represents all costs paid in line with the Organisation's objectives.

d. Fixed assets

The cost of fixed assets purchased during the year is expensed in the statement of income and expenditure in the year of purchase.

Cash at banks represents an interest bearing saving accounts with interest ranging from 0.5% to 1.25% p.a. and non-interest bearing current accounts held at local commercial banks.

19. SUBSEQUENT EVENT

On 12 June 2014, the Organisation was informed by its main donor, Somaly Mam Foundation (SMF) that SMF could not provide general operations funding and terminated the grant agreement with AFESIP Cambodia effective 12 June 2014.

After an in-person meeting with Executive Director of SMF and receiving a memo on immediate grant termination from SMF without any prior note in advance on 14 June 2014, AFESIP sent SMF a letter requesting the reason for the termination. In the letter, AFESIP also requested at least the second fund instalment so it could enact an emergency plan for the funding beneficiaries (the residents of the three shelters, the women and girls reintegrated into communities and staff members).

After receiving no response from SMF, AFESIP held a staff meeting on 24 June 2014 to announce that downsizing staff and programme activities would be enacted by the end of June to save funding the shelter operations.

On 25 June 2014, AFESIP sent notices of the termination to its supporters and donors and posted the information on its website.

AFESIP received a formal letter of grant termination dated 18 July 2014, which stated that the termination would be effective 'on the date hereof'. AFESIP understood and believed SMF would provide funding from 1 April to 18 July 2014. On 30 July 2014, AFESIP sent SMF a letter requesting clarification of the cut-off date and of the three reasons for the termination listed in the letter, but SMF never responded.

19. SUBSEQUENT EVENT (continued)

AFESIP's emergency restructuring included laying off 39 of 107 staff, the weaving programme, the clinic, the garage, and the four HIV/AIDS programme sub-offices in Pailin, Stung Treng, Anlong Veng, and Koh Kong provinces.

The restructuring aims to keep some programmes operating to support the residents in the three shelters, the women and girls reintegrated into communities, the women in university, and women working in the sex industry in Siem Reap and Phnom Penh. The clinic closure is temporary, and one doctor and two midwives from the health care programme still attend to shelter residents and the people reintegrated into communities.
